

The Feast of the Sacred Heart

The Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus is on Friday, when the Church remembers the love of God towards humanity revealed in Jesus, symbolised by his heart.

Although perhaps more familiar today in the Roman Catholic Church, devotion to the Sacred Heart may have been started by an English Puritan, Thomas Goodwin, who in 1651 wrote a book entitled "The Heart of Christ in Heaven Towards Sinners on Earth". This book became very popular, and not only in England. It is known that a copy was owned by St Charles de la Colombière, the French Jesuit who afterwards began to promote devotion to the Sacred Heart in the Catholic Church.

The Feast of the Sacred Heart reminds us, not only of the infinite love and mercy of God revealed in Jesus, but also that all Christians, of whatever tradition, have but one Lord and draw their life and inspiration from that source.

Gospel (John 6.51-58)

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John

Glory to you, O Lord

Jesus said to the Jews, 'I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats of this bread will live for ever; and the bread that I will give for the life of the world is my flesh.'

The Jews then disputed among themselves, saying, 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?' So Jesus said to them, 'Very truly, I tell you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you have no life in you. Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood have eternal life, and I will raise them up on the last day; for my flesh is true food and my blood is true drink. Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them. Just as the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven, not like that which your ancestors ate, and they died. But the one who eats this bread will live for ever.'
